



Adrian Gordey Transported into Maryland

On 08 June 1675 William Brereton proved his right to 350 acres of land in Maryland by transporting seven people including Adrian Gordey into the province to inhabit. The original of this document is located in the Maryland Land Patent Records, as recorded in Patent Book No. 15, folio 318. In 1836 a sequence of early patent records were re-transcribed into Liber (Book) LL. The stamp "Folio" followed by 318 indicates the beginning of folio 318 in the original document. This copy was made from microfilm SR 4327-1 housed at the Edward H. Nabb Research Center for Delmarva History and Culture, Salisbury University in Salisbury Maryland.

May 11th William Meskin merchant proved his rights to nine hundred and fifty acres of land for transporting Robert Harrow, Matthew Jenkins, Edward Bateman, Humphrey Jackson, Richard Powell, Leonard Comblison, John Atkinson, William Lewis, William Reynolds, Thomas Highway, Joseph Boyce, Daniel Cox, Thomas Botes, John Fowse, Benjamin Mathews, Michael Bennett, Merry Davis, Mary Davis and Jane Carter into this province to inhabit.

June 8th William Poreror proved his rights to three hundred and fifty acres of land for transporting himself, Sarah his wife, William his son, Nicholas Todvane, Adrian Gardey, Edward Paine and Mary Meale into this province to inhabit.

Eodem Die, Edward Evans proved his rights to fifty acres of land for finishing his time of service in this province.

Eodem Die Thomas Jones proved his rights to two hundred and fifty acres of land for transporting himself, Edward Seage, John Edmonds, Rebecca Edmonds, John Edmonds Jun^r into this province to inhabit.

July 13th John Jenkins planter proved his rights to one hundred and fifty acres of land, fifty acres thereof for finishing his time of service in this province and one hundred acres more for transporting Sissanna his wife and

July 26th Michael Grey proved his right to fifty acres of land for transporting Hannah Grey his daughter into this province to inhabit.

Eodem Die Benjamin Somers proved his rights to one hundred acres of land for his & his wife Elizabeth finishing their times of service in this province.

July 31st Phillip Adams proved his right to fifty acres of land for finishing his time of service in this province.

August 10th Matthew Dorman proved his right to fifty acres of land for his wife Philippa finishing her time of service in this province.

Eodem Die John Richardson proved his right to fifty acres of land for transporting himself into this province to inhabit.

Sept. 23rd James Davis proved his right to fifty acres of land for transporting Rachette Davis his daughter out of Virginia into this province to inhabit.

Sept. 28th John Millward Taylor proved his right to fifty acres of land for transporting himself out of Virginia into this province to inhabit.

Eodem Die Lavinia Gony Carpenter proved his rights to one hundred and fifty acres of land for transporting himself, Edward Lavinia his son into this province to inhabit.

Eodem Die John Culhoun proved his right to fifty acres of land for finishing his time of service in this province.
